

- A minimum of 5 scores with 3 different riders

- Horse can be un-papered, but must have an ODS registration number
- Horse must be part of an active riding or lesson program
- Horse must be 5 years old or older
- Recipient is determined by median score
- Award will be presented to the program that owns the horse
- Scores can cross all levels

ODS Academy Rider Award Requirements:

- A minimum of 5 scores on 3 different horses
- Must have ridden a test at USDF Intro level or above
- Rider must be a member of ODS
- Scores can cross all levels above Intro
- Recipient is determined by median score
- Rider cannot be the owner of the horse
- Horse must have an ODS registration number

A line will be added to the schooling show entry forms to indicate that the horse is an Academy horse so that the horse and rider are eligible for the award.

He continues to develop and expand his ideas as he presents his clinics both throughout the US and in England and Scotland. This year he included Costa Rica and Portugal to his International tour. His loyalty to those of us who have worked with him for so long will ensure his return to riders and auditors here in Oklahoma

WHEN: Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, October 29 – 30, 2016

0900 – 1100 Lecture and unmounted exercises

1200 – end Mounted work

WHERE: Rivendell Farm (25395 South 4130 Road #B)

Claremore, Oklahoma

WHAT: The clinic involves both unmounted and mounted work, as well as lecture/theory.

This is not your typical clinic setting, where people come for their lesson and leave. These are full days of instruction with lots of rider participation and interaction. He will lead us in unmounted ground work exercises to explore the feeling of balance and explain how that relates and influences the horse. There is a sound system, so you will be able to hear what James is saying to the riders. He interacts with the audience and questions and

observations are encouraged.

Because most participants now are familiar with his work, rides will be

Half-hour privates. If riders desire, this can be adapted to one hour semi-privates.

We can be flexible!

FORMAT: James is suggesting our format for this clinic be a commitment from the riders to ride all three days

If possible. He feels his information will be better absorbed and incorporated into your riding if it is reinforced and confirmed over a three day session. Price break is included for three days.

Riders unable to commit for three days will certainly be welcome.

2017 WORLD CUP OF DRESSAGE IN OMAHA

It is always hard to know where to start (or stop!) when trying to condense the experience of seeing the top International riders perform at an event like the World Cup. There will be many articles that come out describing the riders, horses, and performances, so I will leave that to them. What I will put down here are the general impressions I'm taking away that I hope to continue to apply to my own riding. I will never canter down THAT center line! But I hope to make my own centerlines better from having watched these wonderful horses piloted by such skilled riders.

*Details, details, details! Paying attention to all the little things while navigating the arena. I watched how virtually every rider rode into virtually every corner, fully using the whole arena, not just 20 meter segments. Of course, you must expect this at this level, but seeing how riding into the corners required both horse and rider to focus on precise balance of each footfall. As a result, coming out of the corner the horses were already standing up, balanced, not leaning on the inside shoulder so the rider didn't have to spend (waste) time on rebalancing before beginning another movement or heading across the diagonal in an extended gait. Efficiency. If you don't lose it (balance) you don't have to remake it.

*Preparation! I noticed this most with Steffen Peters and his young mare, Rosamunde. She is just 10, so Grand Prix is relatively new for her and she is still learning how to manage it. Strength is still an issue for her, and she is building toward the time when she is strong enough to "own" Grand Prix. Steffen is a master at taking care of his horses, preparing them for movements, being so careful to make the ride be a success for the horse. It was clear to me that he knows where she is tenuous in movements (the tempi changes) and it was wonderful to see how he subtly helped her balance and be in the best moment possible to succeed. All his changes were clean and accurate. To do this he didn't ask for fabulous brilliance, and allowed her to swing her haunches side to side in the 1's to get 15 clean changes rather than insisting on total straightness which requires more strength & might have caused her to miss the timing. The other riders could be seen doing similar things, preparing the corners, managing footfall by footfall before a movement, shifting their position slightly to change their weight aids, using half halts. Everyone let their horse know something was about to happen, they never just casually or carelessly blundered into a movement or change of pace or gait.

*Cooperation! This is a level beyond just obedience. Yes, a couple of even these horses were "just" obedient. But when seeing those horse/rider partnerships where there was obvious mutual respect and trust, the obedience went beyond being just that, to being cooperation between horse and rider. Laura Graves and Verdades are there, where it seems he is waiting for her every aid, ready to say "yes!" every time she makes a request. He clearly understands and trusts her, and has therefore developed so much self-confidence. As a result, it gives the impression that Verdades now "owns" the Grand Prix, every footfall is controlled and precise, and he is so confident and connected to Laura. Rides like those seemed so smooth and fluid, never a time when the horse offered resistance or objected to an aid or request.

*Patience! Again, refer to the above with Steffen. With him especially, there was never a sense of urgency in his rides. He gave the impression that had all the time in the world to prepare his horse for the next movement. This was especially evident during the warm up day on Wednesday, when all riders came out in casual dress and had 30 minutes in groups of three to let the horses see the arena. Some (who I most admired in all their riding) came in at the walk, long reins, letting their horses have plenty of time to look around. Casual (but accurate) bringing the horse up to the work, short work intervals, long rein again. The

attitude of those riders was unrushed, no pressure on the horse. Others (not so admired by me) came in with a greater sense of urgency and getting things done. No patient or casual time for them, working every possible movement of the test. I'll take the more patient route!

*Accuracy! It goes without saying that at this level you by golly better be very accurate! Deciding points can easily be lost by carelessly not being right AT the letter for a transition or movement. So practice now, at Training, First, or any level. No excuses, no careless riding, make accuracy a way of Life!

*Have FUN! At all costs, remember this one! If it isn't fun for you, it won't be fun for the horse, and vice versa! Remember we are all supposed to be doing this difficult thing called Dressage because we love it, love the feeling of the connection with our horses, and most of all, because we love the horses. Fun things at the Cup: Steffen was in warm up with the young lady from Ireland. Of COURSE, the crowd was all about him and Rosamunde, applauding when he did something the crowd could recognize and appreciate as well done. Judy quietly worked her horse, looking lovely, but overshadowed by Steffen. At one point they were arranged in the arena that she was slightly ahead of him and turned down centerline. He turned behind and off to the side so they were almost in a Pas de Deux. She halted at X, and he slid up next to her, then looked over and grinned. She hadn't realized he was there at first, and broke into a huge grin when she realized what he had done! It was as if he was giving her a little moral support and boost ~ let's have fun and relax, what a gracious man. And then of course there was the final ceremony and Isabell Werth and her champagne! If you haven't seen that, go check it out, for it is surely on YouTube by now. She was given a bottle of champagne, shook it vigorously, the top exploded off & she proceeded to spray first Carl Hester (third place) and then turned the bottle on Laura Graves (second)! That's not enough, she took a big slug of it, then marched around to Carl, Laura, and all three grooms and tipped the bottle for each of them. We are all together in this she seemed to say, and just being here is a success!

*Lastly, remember how much we love them, these fine horses who work so hard for us. So many riders hugged their horses after the final salute, some stayed on their necks for several strides, one pointed to her horse (it's him, not me!) some cried for joy and love. Most touching to me was seeing Isabelle's groom struggling not to cry (and not succeeding) because she was so proud of Weihegold, chin trembling, burying her face in the mare's neck. It really has to be about the love.

These events are extraordinary on many levels. To draw together so many people who share the love of horses in motion is an amazing experience. Nothing compares to seeing it live. To see this caliber of riding in person, up close is inspiring and exciting. If you ever have the opportunity, do not let it pass you by. You will be thrilled, touched, moved to emotion, and get a better vision of where we are all trying to be as riders by seeing how it is done at this level.
