#### More Member News:

I have been blessed to have had some amazing horses. I have rescued horses for about 15 years. I was honored to ride a rescued Hanovarian, General, who is 32 today and retired. A beautiful Oldenburg, Aleron Lunar, who is deceased but taught me much, despite his lymphangitis that kept him partially lame at times. My most recent rescue is a lovely Rhinelander named Comet. He was found by a close friend. She called me up and said we must go see this horse. So we did. He was located in a little town in South Oklahoma. When we got there at this huge western facility he was thin, hyper and a bit frantic. the young lady that had him just wasn't sure he would work at their facility, He had already caught his leg in a fence and cut his leg, thru the coronary band. He had a prior Dressage background, including a therapeutic run. I had my doubts; this didn't look like a dressage horse, and he was definitely lame with a suspensory injury. We got on (by practically jumping up at a trot) and managed to get a ride in. By all accounts I probably should have walked away, but God said, "take him", and I did. We loaded him up, and rode him that day. He was hectic and fast, but willing. Over the last two years, he learned: not to run me over, to back out of my space, to stand still to mount, and to put his head down for the bridle. We have had lots of discussions, some tears, a dump or two, and recently in January, a broken foot. He is not a "free" horse. I have him on supplements, and spent plenty getting him sound. He is high maintenance, but he is mine, and he looks to me now for guidance, and nickers at me when I'm near. We have come to an understanding, and he has taught me a lot about patience, clear cues, timing, and steady contact, with softness. He recently gave me the greatest gift, a Bronze Medal Sat July 2nd, and if he and God are willing we will go for silver!

High Scoring Oklahoma Dressage Riders Awarded by Hometown Favorite Tack Shop, The Horse of Course

Third Level test one went to Jonni Allen and FWF Princess Juniana as the highest-scoring open combination. The Horse of Course concluded by awarding open rider Emily Miles and Floretienne for their win in the FEI Prix St. Georges.

Emily Moser and No Cameras Please, better known as "Blake," were thrilled to win The Horse of Course High Score Award, as this is one of their first USDF rated competitions. "We are having a blast, and meeting some really nice folks," Moser said. "I'm so grateful to The Horse of Course for the High Score Award cooler; it is very sharp! Blake's brow-band is actually from The Horse of Course— I love it and we get lots of compliments on it."

Winner Lily Rhodes with Details At Last was also proud to be rewarded for her high score. Rhodes said, "It was really a great way for us to see how hard we had worked together for the past few months for the show. We were successful and had a great time. Winning the cooler was just the cherry on top! I'm sure I will be shopping at The Horse of Course again soon!"

#### **RIDER'S RECOMMENDATIONS:**

I must apologize for not keeping up with my monthly articles, too much to do and too little time. So this month is socks and I have to admit I am not into the flashy thin boot socks so if anyone has favorites please chime in. My favorites are for winter smartwool socks, they come in many weights and I prefer the Hike light crew socks which work year round but they also come in medium and heavy weight. All smartwool socks are made from merino wool which is really warm for the winter but also wicking in warmer weather and it is naturally odor absorbant, you can wear these socks for days and they don't smell,[ not that any of us have smelly feet] they also have great cushioning. Smartwool also has a line of socks for running which I wear in the summer, they are lightwieght and cool. For a great sock to wear under riding boots I recommend "Swiftwick" socks, I love the Performance Four sock, chemically free wicking, thick footbed, medium compression, 3 point arch support, large toe box so no pinching or big toes making holes in the socks and the best of all a double cuff which protects your ankle and Achilles tendon from rubbing and bruising in paddock or tall boots. The "four" refers to the height of the sock and they come in may heights but the four inch is my favorite for underneath riding boots. These socks are designed for athletes and I am so glad to see that more and more manufacturers are actually marketing athletic clothing for riding. Happy riding
