# **Beauty Of Snow Crystals**

Caltech physicist Ken Libbrecht is always on the lookout for the perfect snowflake – only he's looking through a microscope. His incredible macro images of snowflakes show how the incredible crystal structures form and the variety of shapes and patterns they make.

"I really got into this from the science side," Libbrecht told weather.com. "I was thinking about the physics of how crystals grow, and soon realized that ice would be an interesting case study. As I began researching the subject, I learned all sorts of things about snowflakes, and realized that it would make a good topic for a book. Of course that meant I needed pictures, and there were surprisingly few to be had, so I started photographing snowflakes myself."

As it happens, the process of photographing an ice crystal is more complicated than you might think. "You have to photograph the crystals as they are falling," Libbrecht explained. "Once on the ground they quickly lose their beautiful shapes."

Libbrecht sets out a piece of foam-core to catch the falling crystals and scans the board to find the best ones. "When I spot a good one, I pick it up using a small paintbrush, set it on a glass slide, and place it under my microscope," he said.

Libbrecht doesn't just photograph snowflakes. He creates them. "I drop a small crystal onto a sapphire plate, and then blow moist air down onto it, causing it to grow," Libbrecht said. Since he lives in Southern California, creating snowflakes from scratch allows him to photograph them whenever he wants. "Plus, my laboratory snowflakes are even more beautiful than the natural variety because I can photograph them as they grow, so their features are sharper," he said.


Libbrecht encourages others to take a closer look at snowflakes. "Get a small magnifier, go outside during a snowfall, and have a look at what you can find," he said. "Not every snowfall brings great crystals, but you never know."

Libbrecht said the prettiest crystals usually fall when the temperature is between 5 and 10 degrees Fahrenheit. You can keep up with Libbrecht's photography, plus all the interesting snowflake facts he's found over the years, at his website SnowCrystals.com.



**Stellar Dendrites**: These are the most recognizable snow crystals, as you can see from the examples on the right. Their name comes from their star-shaped appearance, along with their branches and sidebranches ("dendrite" means tree-like). Stellar dendrites are also quite large and common, so they are readily spotted on your sleeve, especially if you are wearing a dark fabric. The best specimens usually appear when the weather is quite cold -- about -15 C, or +5 F.

**Fernlike Stellar Dendrites**: These crystals are like Stellar Dendrites (above), but larger and leafier, with many sidebranches that resemble the branches of a fern. If you look carefully, you will see that the sidebranches mostly run parallel to their neighboring branches. You will also see that these crystals are not perfectly symmetrical. The sidebranches on one arm are not the same as those on the other branches.



**Triangular Crystals**: It appears that aerodynamical effects help produce these unusual snow crystals. They are typically small, shaped like truncated triangles. Sometimes branches sprout from the six corners, yielding an unusual symmetry.

These are also the largest snow crystals, and specimens up to 5mm in diameter can be found.



## **ODS Annual General Meeting Report**



The AGM was held January 23 at the OSU Campus in OKC, a somewhat scaleddown location from the past several years. The Board felt this the best option for two reasons. First, of course, was because of Covid restrictions on distancing and the limited number of people recommended in group meetings. But perhaps more significantly we took a hard look at the expenses for AGMs in the past, which have been close to \$2000. Part of those expenses had been defrayed by meals that

attendees purchased for \$30, but that has never covered the cost. Also, we have been very aware that meal cost is prohibitive for some members, especially for families. Some have elected to not have the meal, or leave during the meal and return for the Awards. This year the Board felt it more fiscally responsible to seek a less expensive venue. The meeting was a hybrid, with 16 people attending in person, and 10 or so joining us via Zoom. New **2021 Membership Directories** were handed out with the announcement that this will be available online. Anyone wishing a hard copy may contact Jan Cibula Murrell.

The meeting opened with a review of the year, noting that while it was very disappointing to have had to cancel our three big events, we did put together many alternative and creative events. **GCC** held virtual schooling shows that were well attended, and we initiated new **educational opportunities** by way of **Zoom meetings** almost every month. There was a **live Schooling Show** in the OKC area in September, plus the **Members Appreciation Clinic** in November. Members and volunteers were thanked for their support and positive attitudes, and encouraged to keep this up as we move into 2021.

There was a **Special Recognition** to two members for their achievements in 2019. **Shery Guess** was named the **USDF Volunteer of the Year** for her unwavering efforts over <u>many</u> years. **Kirsten Knutson** was recognized for her participation in the **2019 Festival of Champions**, an event that is by invitation only and given only to the top 15 riders in the nation!

A detailed **Financial Report** was prepared and presented by **Marta Koenig.** At first glance there appeared to be a \$15,112 loss, but Marta's report revealed that \$7575 involved expenses that would actually apply to 2021. This mostly involved expenses related to the Spring Symposium and the May Show, such as facility deposits, show ribbons, and show licenses. Fortunately, the Tulsa Expo Center is rolling those deposits over to be applied for this year. The remaining net loss of \$7537 was mostly a result of not being able to generate any fundraising this year, as well as a slight drop off in memberships. Marta made the good point that there are two ways to offset this kind of loss: either we bring in more money or cut expenses. We look forward to taking steps to increase membership (for example, we gained new members at the Appreciation Clinic), and to be creative with fundraising for the May and August Shows. We succeeded in cutting expenses for the AGM, and also because of the volunteerism of **Tricia and Gwyneth Baggett**, the Directory cost significantly less this year. Your Board will continue to search for ways to rectify the loss sustained this year.


Along those lines, Nancy Trait-Lira spoke with excitement about an idea for a **new Vision Committee** which will be tasked with promoting ODS in new and creative ways, increasing awareness of ODS and thereby encouraging new memberships, as well as developing a two- and 5-year plan to ensure forward progress of ODS.

The revision of the Bylaws was to be considered, but after discussion a motion was made to table this for now until both the Bylaws and the Policies and Procedures sections are completed. These proposed revisions will then be put on the ODS website for all members to review and discuss. Plans are that this will be done by the 2021 Summer Meeting.

Education reported that Beth Baumert has just cancelled for the April Symposium, giving us little time to find a replacement instructor. Requests were made that lower level clinicians be brought in, giving opportunities for lower level riders to receive instruction. A Judges Seminar and clinic with **Dolly Hannon** is coming up in February. Plans are to resume the educational Zoom meetings.

Show committees reported that plans for the **May Show** are well underway. **GCC** will be offering a full calendar of Schooling Shows, and a **Schooling Show/Ride-a-Test** event is set for OKC in March.

Three Board members had fulfilled their terms: **Marta Koenig, Emily Moser, and Nancy Trait-Lira**. Both Marta and Nancy have agreed to return to the Board, and **Pamela Byers** has agreed to run. There were nominations from the floor: Lyn Francik nominated Pamela DeVore; Pamela DeVore in turn nominated Lyn; Lyn also nominated Amanda Edwards, who declined; Amanda nominated Robin Grain-Walkup. With six nominees, there was a written vote taken from the live attendees. The Zoom attendees texted their votes to Erin, our Secretary. When votes were tallied, the three members coming onto the Board are: **Pamela Byers, Marta Koenig, and Nancy Trait-Lira**.



# ODS Annual General Meeting Report (cont'd)

Under New Business, the idea of a new **award for recognized shows** was presented. This would be a wood plaque that would have the rider's name on an engraved plate at the top. As riders achieved scores of 60% or above, plates would be awarded that could then be attached to the plaque. A question was raised about something similar for Schooling Shows. It was decided that, as this will incur an added expense to start up, for now we would begin with recognized shows. Details will be worked out by the Board.

Another new idea is to **develop a division of younger aged riders**, with a smaller age range so that the very young riders do not have to compete against riders in their late teens or up to 21. This was met with a favorable response. Details will be addressed by the Board.

The **Bee Pape Award**, a traveling plaque given during the first day of the May Show, was reported to have been filled up with award plates. Danny and Amanda Edwards have purchased a new plaque and will be donating this ongoing award. That concluded the Business portion of the AGM.

# 45 Random, Amazing & Bizarre Facts About Horses

1. Horses have the largest eyes of any land mammal.

2. Horses can run within hours after birth.

3. When horses look like they're laughing, they're actually engaging in a special nose-enhancing technique known as "flehmen," to determine whether a smell is good or bad.

4. At one time people thought horses were colorblind. They're not, though they are better at seeing yellows and greens than purples and violets.

5. A horse's teeth take up a larger amount of space in their head than their brain.

6. You can generally tell the difference between male and female horses by their number of teeth: males have 40 while females have 36 (but honestly, most us are going to use the much "easier" way).

7. Horse hooves are made from the same protein that comprises human hair and fingernails.

8. The horse trailer ("horse box") was invented by Lord George Bentinck, a U.K. man who needed a more effective transport for getting his six horses from one racetrack to another.

9. In 1872, Leland Stanford (1824-1893) made a bet that at some point in the gallop all four of a horse's legs are off the ground at the same time. Eadweard Muybridge (1830-1904) proved him right by using a series of 24 cameras and photographing a racehorse named Sallie Gardner.

10. Horses are more secure and comfortable when trailering if they can face the rear, but they prefer openings.

### Tex-Over Farms CDI\*\* Houston Dressage Spring Classic April 30- May 4, 2021

Region 9 is very proud to be one of the few regions outside of Florida and California that hosts a CDI. Thanks to HDS for organizing and to Tex-Over Farms for sponsoring the event this year! Got questions?.....check out the Q & A below.

All riders who are planning to qualify for the NAYC or for the USEF National Championships in any of the junior divisions or in the U25 Grand Prix are encouraged to participate in this event.

### What is a CDI?

CDI stands for 'Concours de Dressage International' and it is a show that is conducted according to FEI rules. The FEI or Fédération Équestre Internationale is the international governing body for equestrian sport while the USEF is our national governing body. A CDI only offers 'FEI' classes which will include GP, Intermediaire, Prix St Georges, FEI Junior and Young Riders, and the FEI Children's and Pony classes. Many times there will be a national show running concurrently with the CDI, and it will offer the other classes that we are used to seeing at our shows. A rider who is riding in the CDI may not enter the national show with the same horse.

#### Why is it important to participate?

Competing at a CDI is an important learning experience. Many of the rules are different in a CDI. Its good to have the opportunity to learn what is expected from riders at a CDI before getting to an FEI championship like the NAYC.

#### Will my scores count toward NAYC qualifying?

Scores may be used for NAYC qualifying at the discretion of the athlete. Scores must be submitted via the <u>USEF CDI and Championship</u> <u>Report Form</u> within the specified deadline stated on the form to count toward qualifying.

#### What rules are different?

There are a number rules that are different for FEI competitions including permitted equipment and medications for both horse and rider. It's a good idea to get familiar with the <u>FEI rule book</u> and discuss any questions that you have with your trainer.

#### What is a jog?

The purpose of the jog along with the in-stall inspection is to positively identify your horse and to evaluate its soundness and fitness to compete.

### Does my horse need a passport?

Yes, your horse will need either an FEI passport or a national passport. Certain vaccinations must be documented on the passport so please allow 8 to 10 weeks for this process. Learn more <u>here</u>.


