Look for the Horse Heat Index chart in this newsletter; it is different from the heat index the weather service puts out. It is specially tailored for horses, gives a good guideline for when it is safe, and when it is a little risky, to partake in strenuous exercise with our horses. Drink water, get electrolytes, be sensible about your riding and be careful as we move into summer!

As you know, our next big event is the GCC sponsored Green Country Dressage Classic on June 19-20.

We can use help in many different ways, from setting the arenas and readying the barns on Friday, to a variety of tasks on the shows days themselves. #### **Horse Heat Index**

This is a good time to revisit the Horse Heat Index. This index has been around in one form or another for years and provides good general guidelines for working your horse. We like it because it's easy to use, and you don't need a calculator.

To use the index, all you need to do is add the current temperature (in Fahrenheit) and the relative humidity (in % RH) together.

The total number determines the conditions. For example, if it is 77 degrees

out and the relative humidity is 65 %, add

them together for a total of 142. When you

have your total, see the table below for recommendations.

Keep in mind that, as with us riders, all horses are different. Some handle heat better than others, so always watch your horse for signs of heat stress.



If Temp °F + % Relative Humidity =

120 or less	Your horse's cooling system is functioning very effectively. You are safe to do all the riding and training you like with no real worries.
120-150	Cooling efficiency is decreasing through this range. Horses will sweat up with work, so make sure they have a chance to rest and cool off over the course of a long ride or heavy work.
150-180	A horse's ability to regulate its temperature is greatly reduced and heat stress is more likely, so be careful. Stick with light work and keep watch for signs of overheating. Make sure to cool your horse down properly afterwards.
180 or more	Your horse has lost the ability to regulate its temperature. Overworking a horse in these conditions can be dangerous, even fatal.  Do your horse (and yourself) a favor and take the day off!!

## Recap: Dr. Hiney's May Webinar

## May Webinar Topic: Spring Maintenance/ Vaccinations



If you have not had the opportunity to listen to one of Dr. Hiney's presentations, you are missing out! She has done two educational webinars for ODS, and both have been excellent. She is articulate,

easy to follow, and presents some fascinating insights on horse health. She is a horse owner herself, so she "gets it" about the care of our equine friends.

In the May webinar Dr. Hiney addressed Spring vaccinations. Yes, yes, we have all heard the routine about giving annual shots, the 4-way, 5-way, 6-way, and what else? Oh yeah Rabies, West Nile, good heavens, do we really have to give them all every year? Dr. Hiney's approach was not the typical line of promoting the need for annual shots. Instead, she spoke about the various diseases the vaccinations are designed to protect against. For example, were you aware that Encephalomyelitis (that would be EE/WE/ VEE) has a 75-90% morbidity (causing sickness) and a 70-90% mortality (causing death!) and that there is permanent mental damage among horses who survive? Mosquitos are the carriers for this, as well as carrying the West Nile Virus.

Speaking of **West Nile**, 30-40% affected will be symptomatic and again, if they recover there is long term influence on gait and behavior. No wonder we are advised to vaccinate annually against these diseases.

And while we are at it, **Tetanus** is fatal in 80% of horses. The organism that causes tetanus is carried in horse manure, so consider the importance of vaccinating *yourself*, as well as your horse.

How about **Influenza**? That is the number 1 respiratory disease for horses, and while generally not fatal, it can put a horse out of training for 3 to 4 weeks because of respiratory

problems. This can damage the lungs, so no forced exercise while recovering is a must!

Then there is **Rhinopneumonitis** which gets into the news from time to time. Dr. Hiney said 50% of the equine population are *permanent carriers*! That means they have had this disease and are capable of shedding the virus when stress causes them to go from a latent to virus-shedding stage. Usually symptoms are mild with fever and nasal discharge, but it can become neurologic. One particular strain, EHV-1, can cause abortion. There is another variation of EHV-1 called EHM, equine herpes myelitis, or

myeloencephalopathy. This variant has a very high morbidity, making the horse extremely sick, and causing neurological conditions such as hind leg weakness. Because of the prevalence, it is a good idea to monitor your horse's temperature twice a day while traveling. At least there is some protection for travelers, and it is recommended that your horse be given 6month boosters at least 2 weeks before traveling. However: DO NOT VACCINATE IF THE HORSE IS SYMPTOMATIC! There are serious complications if that is done.

And if this all is not enough to give you nightmares, how about Rabies? This disease is fatal. Period. The incubation period is usually 2-6 weeks; however, it can be up to 6 months. The good news is there is a vaccine, and Dr. Hiney said that the last reported case of equine rabies in Oklahoma was reported in 2016.

To finish up, there is **Strangles** to consider. Unlike the others, this is of bacterial origin. It is highly contagious, and seen primarily in 1-2 year olds. Fortunately, most horses develop immunity, and they recover with supportive care. If you do choose to vaccinate for Strangles it is imperative to do a titer first!! There are dire consequences for those who vaccinate a previously exposed horse.

Dr. Hiney's method of explaining the diseases that are out there that we can protect our horses from was very effective

and powerful. Be sure to talk with your veterinarian and stay up to date!

#### Six Cool-Down Strategies For Your Horse

## Beating the heat involves water -- both on the inside of your horse via drinking and on the outside of your horse via hosing down.

Summer's heat and humidity can be much more than just uncomfortable. They can be deadly. Horses lose their lives every year to heat stroke. Countless others struggle through anything from weakness to colic as a result of inadequate care in hot weather. Don't let this happen to your horse!

#### **Cool Science**

Your horse's normal body temperature is 98.5 to 101 degrees Fahrenheit. His body temperature rises as he exerts himself. To avoid reaching temperatures that can damage his brain and organs, he must be able to get rid of that heat.

Your horse has several ways to stay cool. Some of the heat is transferred to the air exiting his lungs. The remainder is carried to the skin surface by the bloodstream. Blood vessels very close to the surface of the skin dilate, and dissipate heat through conduction, convection, and evaporation.

Conduction is the transfer of heat from the body to the cooler air.

Convection is the movement of hot air away from the body's surface, replacing it with cooler air.

Evaporation of sweat is absolutely necessary for efficient heat removal.

#### **Cool Your Hot Horse**

Here are six ways you cool your horse as the temperature rises.

**Create a breeze.** Slow walking creates a bit of a breeze over your horse's body surface to enhance convective cooling. A fan works even better!

Find cooler air. Shade provides cooler air temperatures, which also enhances convective cooling.

**Hose him down.** As you hose off your horse, heat is lost due to evaporative cooling. Heat is also lost by conduction, as long as the water temperature is cooler than his body surface.

Myth alert! Note that hosing your hot horse down with cold water doesn't cause any ill effects. The colder the water, the more conduction heat loss occurs.

**Use misting fans.** Using misting fans is the most efficient method of all methods. In fact, Olympic horses are kept cool with this method. The mist causes cooling by conduction and evaporation, while the fans' breeze improves both evaporation and convection.

**Offer water.** Allowing your hot horse to drink also has cooling effects, as the water temperature and your horse's interior temperature equalize. Of course, water also helps to keep him hydrated. Severe dehydration can lead to organ damage. *Myth alert!* There are no health risks associated with letting a hot horse drink cold water. And there's no such thing as giving your horse "too much" water.

**Add electrolytes.** Your exercising horse loses electrolytes along with water in his sweat. His cells function like small batteries with different concentrations of electrolytes inside versus outside the cell. There are even differences in concentrations between the structures inside the cells.

Another function of electrolytes, especially sodium, is to "hold" water in your horse's body. To maintain proper hydration levels, his brain constantly monitors sodium concentration. Thirst is triggered if the concentration of sodium gets too high; salt hunger is triggered if sodium gets too low.

#### **Electrolyte-Replacement Checklist**

There's a place for electrolyte supplements, but they have to be used correctly. Use this checklist to get started.

- \_\_ Use plain salt to meet your horse's baseline sodium and chloride needs. Give him 1 ounce per day in winter, 2 ounces per day in summer.
- \_ If your horse is working two hours or less at low sweating rates, or one hour or less at moderate sweating rates, add 1 extra ounce of salt for each hour of low sweating work, 2 ounces for each hour of moderate sweating.
- \_ If your horse is working longer than the times above, feed the extra salt only to meet the needs of the first two hours (or the one hour of moderate sweating), then use an electrolyte replacement for any additional work above that level.
- \_\_ Crucial! Give your horse as much water as he wants, as often as he wants it!


