

How To Slow Down Your Fast Eater To Reduce The Risk Of Choke

L ating too rapidly is a common cause of equine choke, a condition that occurs when your horse's esophagus becomes blocked. If you have a fast eater, making a few feeding changes will decrease the likelihood that your horse will develop equine choke.

Choke Symptoms and Causes

Choke is more likely to occur if your horse bolts down dry hay, concentrated feed, or other types of feed. Saliva normally moistens the feed, making it easier to pass through the esophagus, the tube that carries food from the mouth to the stomach.

When your horse eats quickly, there's not enough time for the saliva to soften the feed. Dry feed can collect in a thick ball that becomes stuck in the esophagus, blocking it completely or partially. Although your horse tries to swallow, the blockage doesn't budge.

Signs of equine choke may include:

- Repeated attempts at swallowing
- Coughing or gagging
- Feed and saliva discharge from your horse's mouth and nose
- Not eating
- Extended neck
- Drooling



What You Can Do to Prevent Choke

Choke is an emergency that could lead to dehydration, pneumonia, infection, and even death if not treated promptly by your equine veterinarian. Fortunately, you can reduce your horse's risk of developing the condition by following these suggestions:

- Schedule a Dental Exam. Your horse may not be chewing food properly due to an abscess or painful cuts caused by a sharp tooth. Dental treatment will improve your horse's comfort and chewing ability.
- **Try a Grazing Muzzle.** Muzzles aren't just helpful for grazing horses. Fitting your horse with a grazing muzzle will also force it to eat grains much more slowly.
- Free Feed Your Horse. When feed is only offered a few times per day, feeding-related stress may cause your horse to gulp it down in a matter of minutes. Making feed readily available can curb that behavior. Of course, if you decide to free feed, you'll probably want to offer lower-calorie feed, like Timothy or Bermuda hay.
- **Feed More Often.** Just like free feeding, providing many small meals during the day may make your horse feel less stressed about the food supply.
- Use a Slow-Feed Hay Net. Your horse has to work to get the hay out of the small holes in the net, which slows down eating and reduces waste. It may take a little while for your horse to get used to the new feeding method. Equine Wellness suggests placing hay in the net and also next to it for a few days until your horse figures out how the slow-feed hay net works.
- **Don't Let the Bullies Win.** A horse may eat more rapidly if it's afraid that another horse will steal its food. If you think bullying behavior may be a contributing factor, separate the horses during feeding.
- Add Obstacles to the Feed Bucket. Your horse will need to eat more carefully and slowly if the bucket contains a few rocks or balls.
- Add Feed to a Tray. Spreading feed in a tray, rather than placing it in a bucket, will slow down your fast eater.
- **Soak the Feed.** Wet feed passes through the esophagus more easily than dry feed. If your horse is prone to developing choke, moistening the feed may offer a solution to the problem.





Turnout Time Can Reduce Horses' Risk of Soft Tissue Injury

Researchers found an inverse relationship between length of paddock turnout and risk of soft tissue injuries in non-elite horses.

Soft tissue injuries to the tendons and ligaments of horses' lower limbs are common in riding horses. According to previous studies, these injuries are to blame for 13-18% of horses that require rest and rehabilitation and 33% of training losses and retirement in sport horses of all disciplines. But what if simply providing your horse with more turnout could reduce his risk of joining these statistics?

Abigail Reilly, an undergraduate at Centenary University, in Hackettstown, New Jersey, along with assistant professor of equine studies Jesslyn Bryk-Lucy, DVM, recently conducted a study investigating this topic. Reilly presented their findings

at the Equine Science Society's 2021 virtual symposium.

The Association Between Tendons, Turnout, and Fitness

Horses' tendons adapt to changes in their biomechanical environment—basically, they restructure in response to movement, said Reilly. Research has shown that this process occurs more rapidly under conditions such as turnout.

Getting into the physiology, she explained that "thick collagen fibers provide tensile strength to the tendons but don't have much give. They are formed under static conditions. Thin collagen fibers allow elasticity of the tendons—these thin fibers are formed with exercise. Exercised and pastured horses have more thin fibers, meaning their tendons are more equipped to adapt to their movements."

Pastured and exercised horses also tend to have greater fitness than stalled horses, and studies show fitness can reduce soft tissue injury likelihood in humans and horses alike.

A common way to define fitness and analyze injury occurrence, said Reilly, is by calculating acute to chronic workload ratio (the difference between baseline workload and intense training days). A low ratio means a mild change in workload and less chance of injury, while a high ratio indicates big spikes in workload, which is when injuries often occur.

"I was curious if this principle applied to nonelite horses with varying amounts of turnout," she said. "If a horse has low chronic workload, like a stalled horse, they will have a lower baseline fitness. When these horses are asked to perform, there will be a large spike in the ratio no matter the intensity of work. If horses are out on pasture, they're maintaining a higher chronic workload because they're walking, grazing, and being a horse. When they are asked to perform and have a spike in the ratio, they already have this baseline fitness, and the difference between the acute and chronic workload is less."

A Study of Lesson Horses

Reilly hypothesized that horses with more than 12 hours of turnout per day would have significantly less incidence of soft tissue injuries than horses turned out for less than 12 hours because of their increased baseline fitness. Studies have shown that 12 hours is enough time to cause a physiological change in response to exercise. She and Bryk-Lucy performed a retrospective cohort study of 146 lesson horses averaging 17 years of age at Centenary University's equestrian center from 2014 to 2020. They examined all horses' medical records over those six years to identify if and when they had experienced a soft tissue injury. Bryk-Lucy and another resident veterinarian had diagnosed all injuries using either ultrasound, MRI, or process of elimination. All horses were managed similarly, had consistent workloads appropriate for their riding level, and exercised on the same arena surfaces. Reilly said they did, indeed, find a significant difference between soft tissue injury incidence between the two groups. Specifically:

- •Of 57 horses with more than 12 hours of turnout per day, 14 (25%) sustained soft tissue injuries.
- Of 89 horses with less than 12 hours of turnout per day, 45 (51%) sustained soft tissue injuries.

"These results suggest an inverse relationship between length of paddock turnout and risk of soft tissue injuries in nonelite horses," said Reilly. "They also support that turnout maintains a baseline level of fitness so horses can better handle acute spikes in workloads and, thus, have reduced risk of injury."

Horse owners can apply these findings by offering as much turnout as is possible and appropriate for their horses.

Road To Gold Medal Takes Many Paths

We dedicated dressage riders are usually goal oriented individuals who apply it to our riding. Being no different, my goal was to earn my medals on horses that I have trained myself with horses on a budget. And like many, it started years ago. My first horse I had brought along to 3rd but between working and getting my masters and administration certificate full time. I never gave a thought to more than the occasional show that I could fit into my schedule. It wasn't until I retired from being a principal to be a stay-athome mom that I thought about making serious riding goals. I had purchased literally a lame horse, Accolade, who I thought was the most beautiful horse whose total vocabulary was, "Yes, I'll try for you." I have called Fritz "My horse from God." He came along at a difficult point in my life. Horses can save us during those times. Between my first horse and Accolade, I paid my dues on horses who tested my skill at staying on their backs! Between my vet who loved "Fritz" and my skilled farrier, we were able to keep Accolade mostly sound. With his navicular, Fritz

NEVER had a lengthening let alone a medium and extensions weren't even a thought! Fritz and I just had to be better at all the other moments to make up for the 5 (plus or minus) for all medium/extensions we did not have. After earning my bronze, we moved to 4th and PSG. Fritz and I had earned all our scores for silver except one. Fritz's navicular came back, and I decided that was it. My vet convinced me that Fritz was fit enough at 21 for surgery. We did, and he was sound! I was not going to push Fritz after surgery at his age, so I leased him at my farm to a friend who was a lower level rider. Due to life changes, she was unable to continue after 3 months. Feeling horses live longer and healthier lives with a little job, I started riding him again. He just

It rained so hard it flooded the arena! Who would have guessed that water splashing his belly would raise his back to the point we had some EXTENSION-LIKE movements! Fritz and I earned a 65% and our last score for SILVER!!!

With the exception of a pony for my daughter, like most of us my horses were inexpensive meaning \$3K or less! Then enters World Classic, a 3 y/o, into my life who was imported from Germany. Like all the horses I seem to purchase young. "WC" grew up to be very tall. He was so sensitive, though! So light with the contact or I could have never ridden him. He had an issue though. He HATED the warm-up situations and white horses! One summer I just hauled him to show after show taking my life into my hands until he finally thought the warm area with many horses wasn't so scary. 

you training, you know that horses sometimes hurt themselves. After training him to L1 with piaffe and passage which were so easy for him, he injured himself and our dressage career is over. Shortly before WC's injury, Divino enters my life. His entry is not how you would have liked to receive a new horse. It was through the death of a close friend. Peggy, Divino's mom, who was healthy, thin and active became ill, and was gone in less than 12 hours. When Divino came to live next to a school that had football players practicing near my arena, he lost his mind! With time he settled and would even trail ride on the buckle. I don't know about you, but I train mainly on my own with an outdoor arena and, sorry to say, no mirrors. With the sporadic help of clinicians and Dede, Divino and I worked from 2nd level through GP. Along the way, some clinicians tried to convince me to sell Divino for a young rider's horse as he is a lovely mover and had the training. Like most every horse I have, they stay with me for life, but especially Divino! Divino and I continued on our path until we got to GP. I am blessed that Divino has a very nice piaffe and passage as we do NOT have a line of one tempis. Again, here I go with having to make other movements better for I am missing a movement. The day I got my last score for my GOLD medal was the day that my brand-new show bow broke, my boot's zipper split wide open, and I had grabbed two different white gloves! Thank goodness I had my old show bow with me, stall neighbors at the show who grabbed duct tape and electrical tape for my boots, and a student who ran and grabbed a matching pair of gloves. By this time, I was so chilled that nothing mattered but riding the test the best that we could. 


